


# PÅPER WEÅVİNG



FOLD PAPER to DOTTED LINE.



CUT along DOTTED LINES.



UNFOLD paper. WEAVE strips of paper OVER and UNDER the slits.



EXPERIMENT with different COLORS and PATTERNS to create a unique design.




#### DID YOU KNOW?

#### DESİGN-A-BASKET

For centuries, Choctaw basket makers have created works of art from the swamp cane that grows along Mississippi creek banks. Present-day weavers use the same methods as generations before them. However, they also add innovations that reflect the changing times. The designs on contemporary Choctaw baskets include stripes, zigzags, chevrons, squares and diamonds.

Grab some crayons, colored pencils or markers and use the grid as a guide to create your own unique design!





## PĂPER WEĂVING

Choctaw baskets are made using the PLAITING (over-under, over-under) method. Use the colorful strips to create your own unique design!

#### DID YOU KNOW?

- Cane basketry is the traditional artform for which Choctaw people are most widely recognized today.
- Choctaw basketry has ancient roots. Some preserved pieces of basketry are over 7,000 years old.
- A general Choctaw word for basketry is tapushik.
